Peter Wynne-Willson is an experienced Theatre-in-Education and Young People's Theatre writer and director. He was the founder and first director of Big Brum, which after 40 years remains the Midlands foremost Theatre-in-Education Company. Since leaving in 1992 he has divided his time between writing, mostly for young audiences, directing projects and performances, acting as a 'creative agent', teaching in universities, working as story-maker and early years artist, and creating collaborative work between the UK, Korea and Japan.
